Key Leadership

Ana Garcia-Ashley, Gamaliel Executive Director

Ana began her work at Gamaliel in the early 1990s, as Lead Organizer for MICAH (Milwaukee Inner City Congregations Allied for Hope) a Gamaliel affiliate. During her tenure there, the organization won \$500 million reinvestment commitment from the city's banks. Ana was also the founding organizer for WISDOM, a Gamaliel affiliate in Wisconsin. Ana has been a member of the Gamaliel central staff for nearly two decades, serving as Senior Trainer at Gamaliel's National Leadership Trainings and co-director of the Civil Rights for Immigrants (CRI) campaign.



Angela was the founding chairperson for the Gamaliel State Directors table of the Gamaliel Network from 2007 until December 2015 and now serves as the Senior Trainer for Gamaliel. Angela has trained organizer and leaders across the United States, in Africa and several Provinces in South Africa (Cape Town, Port Elizabeth, Johannesburg and Durban).

Training Team



Beatriz Garcia is a recognized community and labor organizer, trainer, and youth mentor. For more than 15 years she has specialized in grassroots power-building, leadership development and is responsible for training and developing new organizers in California and Hawaii. Beatriz is a proud Chicana, daughter of Mexican immigrants. She was born and raised in Oxnard, CA and holds a B.A. in Political Science and Comparative Studies in Race and Ethnicity (dual degree) from Stanford University.



Rev. Cynthia Jarrold is the National Policy Director for Gamaliel. In that role she has focused mostly on Gamaliel's transportation and jobs, education, and civil rights for immigrants campaigns. She has also played a major role in implementing Gamaliel's long-term agenda. Before coming to Gamaliel (via MORE2), Cynthia was the Minister of Education at Leawood Baptist Church in Leawood, KS, and djunct instructor at Central Baptist Theological Seminary and Ottawa University, where she taught worship, formation for ministry, and ethics.



Mary Lim-Lampe is the Executive Director of Genesis. Twelve years ago, she was called into organizing during a "perfect storm" at a Gamaliel Network organizer training when a good agitation by her mother was followed by her throwing up and making a decision to come out of the shadows and build power. She graduated cum laude from the University of Missouri-St. Louis (BA-Political Science) and holds a J.D. from St. Louis University-School of Law. The biggest reason "why" she does what she is does is her 14 year old daughter, Caitlyn.



Sister Cheryl Liske, Executive Director of Gamaliel of Michigan, has over 25 years of organizing and training experience both on the state and national level. Sister Liske was the primary organizer in the development of all five of the Gamaliel organizations in Michigan. Cheryl is a top tier trainer in the Gamaliel network and a member of the Gamaliel State Directors table. Sister Liske has conducted leadership trainings for community organizing in Romania, South Africa, England, Scotland and North Wales.



Lora McDonald has been the Executive Director of MORE2 for over eight years. McDonald has been a social worker for over 22 years in the metropolitan Kansas City area. She has organized around criminal justice/ prisoner reentry issues and has a track record of organizing to win over 10 public policies specific to restoring rights of people returning from incarceration. McDonald is a lifelong resident of Missouri.

Teresa Contreras Mora was born in Michoacan, Mexico and immigrated to the US at the age of 9. Her passion for immigration organizing and law comes from her experience growing up as an undocumented woman in Southern California. She has organized with the LA Country Federation of Labor and Unite Here Local 11 and recently joined the organizing staff at Gamaliel Metro Chicago/Pilsen Neighbors Community Council, where she is developing the Academy of Parents in Leadership and Fuerza del Sol. She has a bachelor's degree from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) on Chicana/o Latina/o Studies Border and Transnational Studies, Labor, Law, and Policy Studies.



Audrey J. Murrell conducts research, teaching and consulting that helps organizations better utilize and engage their most important assets – their human and social capital. She is currently Associate Dean of within the College of Business Administration and Associate Professor of Business Administration at the University of Pittsburgh, School of Business. Dr. Murrell served as the Director of the David Berg Center for Ethics and Leadership at the University of Pittsburgh from 2006 to 2013 and from 2016 to the present.



Catoya Roberts is the national network coordinator for Advancement Project's Formation project where she works to build and sustain a racially diverse coalition of partners. Previously, Catoya served as Associate Director at WISDOM and Executive Director of MICAH. As a Gamaliel organizer she focused on mass incarceration, civic engagement, youth organizing, health equity, and race equity. She was appointed by the Governor of Wisconsin to the Public Health Commission and is also a part of the Robert Wood Johnson Cultural Health Leaders Program. She is an associate minister at New Covenant Baptist Church in Milwaukee, WI.



Rev. Susan Sneed is an ordained Deacon in the United Methodist Church and an organizer for Metropolitan Congregations United(MCU) in St. Louis, MO. She has organized in MCU and its predecessor organizations as both a leader and a professional organizer since 1991. She has organized and trained Ntosake since 1995.

In response to deep, historical systems of patriarchy, in 1993 a group of women organizers and leaders from across the Gamaliel Network created the "Women's Weekend." This weekend was conceived as an opportunity for women to freely explore building a life as a leader in their communities and congregations.

We found that women hungered to find new and powerful ways to transform their lives.

Knowing that women often do not find spaces that are bold, life-giving and affirming, the planners were mindful that they should also honor the spirituality of women. The centerpiece of a closing sermon given by Rev. Dr. Brenda Hayes of the African



Methodist Episcopal Church was a word, "Ntosake." Ntosake originates from several indigenous languages from the southern part of Africa and means, "She who comes with her own things."

Upon hearing the word and its definition, an awakening swept through the room and 75 women declared "We are Ntosake."



Introducing Ntosake Luminaries

For nearly three decades, Ntosake has trained women who have returned to their communities to lead successful issue campaigns that have secured minimum/living wage ordinances; policies that increased the number of women, people of color, and low-income people on construction projects and on-the-job training programs; rent stabilization policies; caps on economic development subsidies for wealthy corporations and individuals; and more. Many among us have returned to run for office, securing seats as mayors and serving on local school boards and city councils. One of us has even won a gubernatorial race and moved on to the U.S. Senate.

Ntosake-trained women are building powerful public lives and making a difference in their neighborhoods, their places of worship, their communities, and this country!

As we wrap up the celebration of our 25th anniversary as Ntosake, we are launching what we hope to become an annual celebration of the women of Ntosake: this legacy booklet of Gamaliel/Ntosake Luminaries which highlights the Rising Stars and Guiding Lights or Stars among us. Affiliates and leaders from the Gamaliel Network have identified "Rising Stars"—young women who are up-and-coming leaders in our communities—and "Guiding Stars or Lights"—women who have led us to where we are today. They have provided tribute pages (which follow) for each of these women along with an investment in the production of this booklet and training scholarships for other women.

Mary Gonzales



Mary Gonzales is one the founders of Ntosake and Gamaliel. She has been a life long community leader and serves as consultant to Gamaliel. Mary is considered one of the founding mothers of Pilsen (Chicago) because of her grassroots impact on the community. Her leadership has impacted on a local level by organizing parents around education, immigration, health care, and civic engagement efforts. She also organized affiliate organizations across California. She served as executive director of Pilsen Neighbors Community Council in the late 80's and into the 90's. Under Mary's dedication to the community, many other leaders emerged.

Ntosake Minnesota Luminaries The Courage to Shine!



Mary Gruber from Minnesota was instrumental in shaping the Ntosake movement. Here's what she remembers:

I was sick of the perception that, as a woman, I'm only good for making coffee? We were ignoring the role of lay leaders and how women were treated differently than men. I was very angry, but I didn't have the right venue for expressing myself.

I was one of two leaders (who were not organizing staff) who helped create Ntosake. We were helping women identify for themselves what their own demons and barriers were to being as powerful as they could be, even within their own organizations. It wasn't just me that was having these issues. It was many of us. I struggled with and pushed for what I wanted out of it. Even some of the celebratory aspects of rituals—the whole spiritual environment that we created, which was so important—I wanted built right into the training, not just as bookends.

Guiding Light: Sr. Gail Guelker, SSND




Metropolitan Congregations United Recognizes Sr. Gail Guelker

Sr. Gail was one of the first Gamaliel organizers in St. Louis, directing Churches United for Community Action, one of the three predecessor organizations to Metropolitan Congregations United. She came to organizing after a career in education. In 1993 she was one of a group of women organizers and leaders from across the Gamaliel Network to found and develop Ntosake. She brought her organizing and teaching skills and her spirituality into the planning and that influence is still felt today. Her passion for women's leadership has continued to be a part of her organizing in St. Louis, St. Charles County and Kansas City. From 2008-20015 Sr. Gail served as the president of Notre Dame High School for Girls. From there she has impacted a whole other generation most especially around the immigrant rights impacting several of her students. Sr. Gail has retired from both Notre Dame and MCU but is still active in serving the St. Louis Community through her parish in North St. Louis City.



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
